QUEEN WHO REIGNED OVER THE HEARTS OF THE PEOPLE

Rajmata was not known much by the people, especially the young generation until she came into limelight after her death on July 24, 2017. This is the true essence of life; she was loved when she was alive and is remembered and respected when she is dead. Rajmata was an exceptional person, affectionate, creative, public-spirited, compassionate, large-hearted, generous and without malice. She had never raised her voice and seen ill-tempered.

Rajmata was born as Mohinder Kaur in Ludhiana on September 14, 1922 to S. Harchand Singh Jaijee, a noble man and member of the Patiala Riyasat Praja Mandal. It could be said that politics ran in her blood early. Married to Maharaja Yadavindra Singh at the age of sixteen, she assumed a new role, the role of Maharani.

She was endowed with stunning beauty and her husband was arguably the most handsome man in India. By the time she was in twenties, her four children- Harminder Kumari, Rupinder Kumari, Amarinder Singh and Malvinder Singh were born. All brought up in the lap of luxury. The family however, did not lose its common touch.

The tragedy of Partition affected Patiala in an unexpected and tragic manner. Tens of thousands of refugees poured into Patiala. Maharaja Yadvindra Singh welcomed them and the Rajmata, the then Maharani played a significant role in settling women refugees from Pakistan, and later in sending Muslim women to Pakistan. It is said that the Maharaja encouraged Mohinder Kaur to join Party politics in 1964, which she did. A queen then became a politician. She was elected to the Rajya Sabha in 1964 on the Congress ticket and served till 1967. Later that year, she was elected to the Lok Sabha from Patiala for a term that lasted till 1967. She very well balanced the role of demanding politician,

royal wife and dedicated mother.

Upon the death of her husband in 1971, she assumed the role of Rajmata (Queen Mother) with her eldest son, Captain Amarinder Singh assuming the role of Maharaja. In 1977, she joined the Janata Party became its general secretary and served another term in Rajya Sabha from 1978 to 1984.

While she retired from active political life, she continued to reign over the hearts of Punjabi subjects in general and Patialvis in particular. Always impeccably turned out, a strong woman, a person who valued relationships and was respectful of people, Rajmata Mohinder Kaur was a brilliant conversationist who had the rare ability to make people feel at ease and engage with them,

often surprising them by remembering small details from previous conversations.

The blue-eyed lively lady left an impact that will be long remembered. On the evening of July 24, 2017, Patiala lost its Queen Mother and a son lost his mother. It was a journey well travelled and a life fully lived. We pray that her soul rests in peace.






How can we revive student's reading habits?

I came to the conclusion that acquiring the latest children's fiction (in all genres) might help. The help of popular children's author Neil Gaiman seemed to be a good idea.




