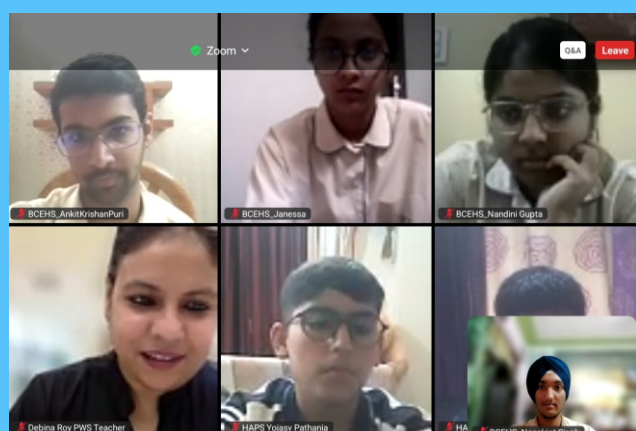
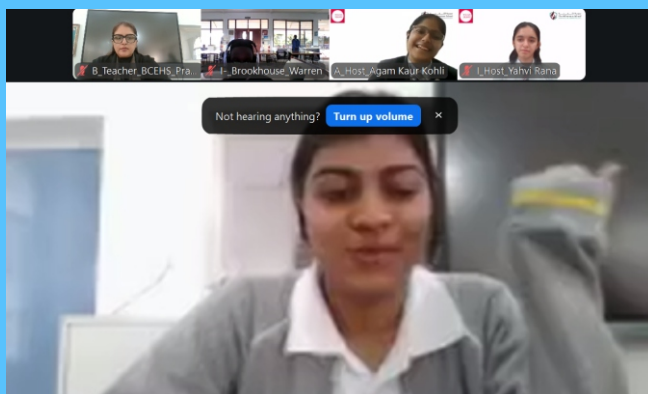




# ROUND SQUARE

Our school had the privilege of hosting three exchange students Katlego Motlhabane, Asanda Thandolwethu Mbangula and Leslie Thabiso Mhlanga from Tiger Kloof Educational Institution, South Africa as a part of the Round Square Programme. Their week long visit brought new perspectives and genuine curiosity, giving our students a chance

to learn about another culture while proudly sharing their own. The following highlights capture the essence of our conversation with them.

**What aspects of our school's academic or co-curricular programmes did you find most engaging?**

Leslie said, "I was especially fascinated by the Robotics Lab. I really enjoyed the hands-on approach, the technology available and the way students collaborated on various robotic projects." She further added, "Participating in the yoga sessions helped me experience calmness and mindfulness. It gave me a completely new perspective on well-being."

**You participated in our Robotics session. How was that experience for you?**

Katlego shared, "The robotics lesson was one of my favourite activities. I enjoyed building and programming basic models and I really appreciated how the mentors guided us step by step." She added, "The experience gave me a new appreciation for STEM learning and showed me how creative it can be."

**How does school life here compare to your school back in South Africa?**

Asanda observed, "This host school seems more disciplined and structured, with a strong emphasis on practical learning, whereas classrooms in South Africa focus more on theory."

**How did your host family welcome you?**

Katlego said, "I was welcomed with a traditional Indian greeting that included the dhol, sweets and a garland. The warm family meals made me feel completely at home."

**What is the first story you will tell your family when you return?**

Asanda shared, "I will tell my family about the warmth and hospitality of Indian people, especially the care shown by the host families. They made us feel valued and cared for from the very first day."

**What were you most excited about when you heard you were coming to India?**

Leslie said, "I was eager to experience India's rich diversity, vibrant traditions, festivals and especially its food."

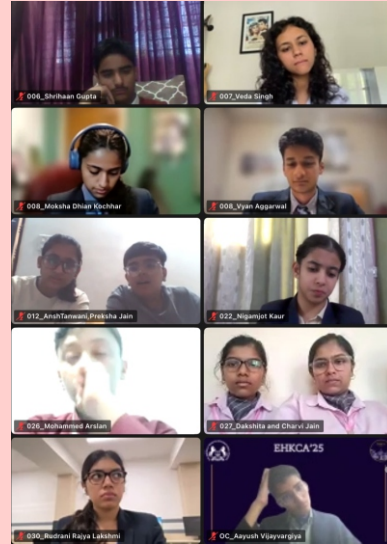
## SAI GLOBAL DEBATE
